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KINELLAR PRIMARY SCHOOL AND PARENT COUNCIL NEWS.

The new 2016 term started under the most difficult of circumstances when large parts of the school were lost to the fire on New Year's night. But out of this adversity has come an overwhelming level of support from the teachers, management team, parents and community. The arrangements that were quickly put in place meant that the school could open the term on time. Since then the school has quickly got back to some normality - albeit a new normal! The work continues and demolition work on the damaged areas began at the end of January and will continue through February.

The support from the community has been phenomenal. From the volunteers who helped rearrange classrooms in January to the donations of provisions for the children to use from day one of term to the monetary donations to the Just Giving page that was set up. It has all helped motivate and energise the management team in these difficult times. The list of contributors and volunteers is too long to mention here but your help is profoundly appreciated thank you!

The Just Giving page raised over £4000 and it has been agreed to set up a small steering group to represent people's ideas on how this sum should be best spent. We also intend to include the children in this decision. Updates to follow on this.

PREVIOUS EVENTS

Prior to Christmas the Parent Council organised the annual Elf Shelf allowing the children to do their own Christmas shopping - this raised £948. We also arranged a Christmas Raffle which raised a further £1493 - we hope the winners of the Marcliffe B&B prize enjoy their stay!!

The parent council provided funds for upcoming school trips for each class and a National Trust membership to be used by the school throughout the year. Aberdeenshire Council has been very supportive to the school at this time and the money raised recently will be put to use very soon.

Unfortunately due to fire safety concerns, the one event that has had to be cancelled recently is the Community Cafe. This is due to the limited number of people the School can currently accommodate in the hall. It is hoped these can re-commence soon.

OTHER SCHOOL NEWS

"Engineering week" was held during January and captured the imagination of all the age-groups (and some of the teachers!).

Primary 1 has been meeting "People who help us" - doctors, firemen and paramedics have all visited the school to explain what they do Primary 2 enjoyed an evening walk up to Tappie Tower at the beginning of February as part of their 'Day & Night' project and enjoyed some hot chocolate at the top and then a bed time story back at the school - everyone slept well that night!

Primary 3 are also getting involved in some outdoor learning and working in the eco garden

Primary 4 has been learning about 'Flight' and hope to visit the airport soon Primary 5 has started work on their annual show and more details will follow on that soon

Primary 6 & 7 had a visit from the Police to discuss cyber-bullying. All pupils were very attentive to this important issue.

School road safety campaign has also been started.

ABERDEENSHIRE COUNCIL REPORT

Aberdeenshire Council's income from the Council Tax, non-domestic rates and Scottish Government grant determines the amount the Council can spend each year from its revenue budget on providing public services. On 11 February, Aberdeenshire Council set its revenue budget for the financial year starting in April. With the continuing Scottish-Government imposed Council Tax freeze and a cut by the Scottish Government in its grant funding to the Council, the Council had to find savings of £28.312 million to balance its 2016/17 budget. It is simply not possible to make savings on this scale without affecting some services provided for residents.

Fortunately, the Council has been able to identify ways of making most of the saving required by means that will not affect service delivery. There are substantial savings from reduced costs, such as lower-than-expected interest rates, fuel and electricity costs. Increased recycling has lowered the amount to be paid in Landfill Tax. Sales from the Council's quarries are up by over £1 million. Increased uptake of school meals means £800,000 less is needed to provide the service.

There are cases where budget provision has been made for higher levels of demand for a service than have actually materialised, so the budget can be reduced to just the amount really needed. There is also scope for making true efficiency savings. One example is included in the 'road network management and maintenance' saving - where £65,000 of the saving is to be achieved by accelerating the replacement of street lights with more energy efficient LEDs.

However, some of the budget reductions made within the £28.3 million total savings will, unavoidably, impact on the service provided. For example, eligibility criteria will be tightened for some social care. For me and other councillors, it is horrible being put in the position of having to vote for cuts to services, but there is nothing the Council can do about the funding package handed down by the Scottish Government. The budget has to be balanced, the savings must be made. Since cuts there must be, what I want to do is minimise the adverse consequences. I believe the majority of the service cuts the Council has decided to make are among the least damaging that could have been found. Whilst I didn't agree with everything in the budget measures voted through, the budget passed for 2016/17 does include some positive changes I welcome. There is extra money for cycling and walking infrastructure and money put aside to invest in renewable energy generation – such as solar panels – to reduce the Council's future energy bills, meaning more of the Council's budget can be used for service provision.

There was no budget proposal that could have been put forward on 11 February that would achieve the required savings and be painless. Overall, within the financial straitjacket imposed on it, I believe the Council has done a good job at avoiding cuts to services this year, while making some targeted investment in priorities.

Because of continuing difficulties and uncertainty over acquiring the land identified for the new, replacement, Kinellar School, the Council decided late last year to revisit the choice of site.

The Council had initiated a compulsory purchase process for the intended new school site in 2013 and had been negotiating since then. However, in circumstances where there is an unwilling seller, the Council is not able to set a timetable for purchase, and due process must be followed. By late last year, uncertainty over when or if the Council would secure the land it was trying to buy made it prudent to consider whether there should be an alternative approach, specifically rebuilding on the current school site.

The choice between rebuilding on the present school site or continuing to try to acquire the replacement school site identified in the local development plan is not straightforward.

There are advantages and disadvantages with both options and neither is risk free. The site identified for the new school in the


local development plan is larger and moving the school to it would free up the present school site, potentially for other community facilities. The present site is smaller than ideal for the larger school needed. Also, there may be other planning applications for the site allocated in the local development plan for the new school if it is not used for that purpose. On balance, though, the certainty that comes with the Council already owning the current school site is probably a decisive advantage, whereas continuing delay is a serious problem.

Clearly, the Council needs to continue to engage and consult with parents and other stakeholders over this important decision, as part of this a meeting was held in Kinellar School on 1 March.



KINELLAR STARS

Kinellar Stars is for 2's and preschool children based in Kinellar Community Hall. We provide sessions for children aged between 2 and 5 years old. It is important to us to provide an environment where children can become confident individuals and successful learners and enjoy their time spent at the group. To facilitate this we have created an open plan setting with different "learning areas" for children to explore.

Kinellar Stars is a charity (Registered Charity Number SCN 011486) run by a voluntary committee of parents/carers of current or past attendees of the group. We employ a Manager, Early Years Practitioners and Support Workers who all work hard to give the children an ideal environment in which to play and learn. We follow the Curriculum for Excellence and are regularly inspected by the Care Inspectorate, work closely with Aberdeenshire Council and are a member of Early Years Scotland, with whom we are fully insured.

Our sessions run as follows:-

- 2's Group Monday to Thursday 9.15am to 11.15am
- Preschool Monday to Friday 9.15am to 12.15am

We accept Council funded places and private places.

The staff have been covering the topic "Keeping Ourselves Safe/People Who Help us" with the children this term. This was partly prompted by the fire at Kinellar School as the children had been curious about what had happened. A Police Officer and a nurse are coming to talk to the children about the roles they play in helping them and keeping them safe. Scottish Week was a mini topic covered to coincide with Burns Day on 25 January. The children had great fun learning some Scottish dancing, Scottish songs and stories and they also tasted some haggis! Chinese New Year will be the next mini topic with the children trying Chinese cuisine and using chopsticks and also making paper dragons and lanterns. A day trip is also planned for the children before the end of term.

As a charity we rely on fundraising for the group. The children are taking part in a sponsored Easter Egg Hunt and we have lots of fun ideas for events in the coming months which include a Quiz Night, Comedy Night and much more — details to follow soon!

We are very grateful to local businesses and individuals who have given us donations of cash and materials all of which benefit the group and the children.

LOCAL COMMUNITY COUNCIL:

We need your help to move forward.

It would be wrong to think that all Community Councils are alike or that they do the same thing. In practice they vary a great deal in terms of how they are organised and the issues they get involved in. This is partly because the legislation that sets out the remit for Community Councils is not specific to their purpose. However, it is also because every community has its own particular needs and priorities.

Community Councils are recognised as the point of contact in communities to seek views and ideas about what is important to that community. The opportunity to get views from your village can be missed if there is no Community Council to be consulted. It is therefore very important that each village has a Community Council to ensure that they are able to receive appropriate services and comment on developments and policies that will impact on their lives.

Community Councils can also develop projects and seek funding to realise these to enhance the quality of life in the

In order to set up and maintain a Community Council we need residents of that Community to give up their time and commit to representing the views of their community. Anyone can become involved, but the best Community Councils often come from those with a range of age, views, backgrounds and experience. The Council will assist with training members in understanding their role and how they can be most effective as a Community Councillor.

The Fintray and Kinellar Community Council has been running successfully for many years but recently failed due to lack of membership. SPOTLIGHT ON- BISHOP FORBES CRESCENT: IT'S ALL IN A NAME

Blackburn, as most readers will know, is a commuter village situated in the parish of Kinellar approximately 9 miles North-west of Aberdeen. The village, currently with a population of 1000, has expanded considerably from the 1970's and the extra housing has challenged those looking for inspiration to give the new streets an identity.

In this short article I hope to explain how Bishop Forbes Crescent came by its name. Who was this Bishop? Why would a street in Blackburn be named after him? What was the connection between a Bishop of Aberdeen and Kinellar? He is probably not given a second thought by most folk who walk past the sign that bears his name but perhaps I can renew some interest in this formidable character and the street that has his name.

Bishop Patrick Forbes was born in 1564 at Corse Castle near Lumphanan, the eldest son of Elizabeth and William Forbes, the Lairds of the Corse Estate. When his father died in 1598 he took over the management of the family estates. He was a deeply religious man and attended St Andrews and Glasgow universities and at the former he was greatly influenced by the famous theologian at the time, Andrew Melville. Patrick Forbes was a passionate, puritanical preacher but was reluctant to enter the Ministry until his good friend John Chalmers, Minister of Keith, asked him to take over his parish. The request was made as John lay dying and Patrick felt compelled to carry out his friend's wishes, accepted the call and was ordained in 1612, at the age of 48 becoming the Minister of Keith in the diocese of Moray.

From 1612 onwards Patrick Forbes's rise to influential positions in Aberdeen was meteoric and he was asked by the King to accept the position of Bishop of Aberdeen in 1618 which he did after much deliberation. He was also appointed Chancellor of Aberdeen University and directed the education and training of future theologians. He was held in great esteem by his congregation and peers and described in the "Times and Life of Patrick Forbes" by WG Snow, as "gentleman of the highest character, devoid of vice or tyranny, peaceable, modest and kindly"

What does any of this have to do with a street in Blackburn? How did this man extend his influence to the parish of Kinellar? In 1626, the farm Cairntradlin, Kinellar, where the Campbell family has lived for many years, was purchased by Bishop Forbes's wealthy brother William for Aberdeen University. It was bought for 10,000 merks and the sale included "Lands of Cairntradlane, mill, mill lands, multures etc and salmon fishing on the Don, lying in the parish of Kinellar"

John Forbes, the Bishop's son was appointed to manage Cairntradlane and the useful investment funded the upkeep of the Aberdeen University Divinity Chair. Cairntradlin remained in the ownership of the university, latterly being rented by various tenants until it was bought by Sylvester Campbell in the early 1940's. The village of Blackburn began to expand in the 1970's with more housing being built as oil and gas exploration brought prosperity to Aberdeen and its satellite villages and it seems only fitting that a man who was so influential in Aberdeen's past and had such a close connection with Kinellar should have a street in Blackburn dedicated to him.

Maybe food for thought when next you make your way to Bishop Forbes Crescent?
