COUNCIL REPORT

Residents will have noticed demolition of the old school and schoolhouse has been completed. Construction of the new school is due to get underway before the end of May.

The 2017 council elections were held on Thursday 4 May, with the votes being counted and results declared on Friday 5 May.

Some changes this time were down to a revision of council ward boundaries undertaken since the 2012 election by The Local Government Boundary Commission for Scotland. As of 4 May, the East Garioch ward (which includes Newmachar, Fintray and Kintore as well as Blackburn) is now larger than it was before. The ward has been extended to the west by moving its boundary much closer to Kemnay and Inverurie. Reflecting the increase in population, the number of councillors representing the East Garioch ward has also been increased – from three to four.

The six candidates who contested the election in East Garioch and the number of first-preference votes they received were:

Martin Ford (Green) – 850 Fergus Hood (Liberal Democrat) – 842 Dominic Lonchay (Conservative) – 1,429 Conor McKay (SNP) – 571 Glen Reid (SNP) – 688 Ann Thorpe (Labour) – 179

After application of the rules for a Single-Transferable-Vote election, the four people elected as the councillors for East Garioch were Dominic Lonchay, Martin Ford, Fergus Hood and Glen Reid.

I'm sure all the candidates would like to thank the 4,559 residents of East Garioch who voted. I'm also sure all four successful candidates are delighted to have been elected.

Speaking personally, I am tremendously pleased to be starting my fifth term on Aberdeenshire Council. It's a great privilege to have been reelected again after 18 years as a councillor. So I would like to express my special thanks to those who put their confidence in me to continue as one of their local representatives.

As I write this just after the results were declared, it is too early to say which parties will form the new Council administration. No party has even close to half the total number of councillors, so some form of coalition there will almost certainly be. Whatever grouping emerges, I hope the Council as a whole will have effective working relationships between councillors of different colours, so there is a preparedness to accept suggestions and good ideas from all sides. There are undoubtedly going to be some tough choices during the next five years, so we need a Council that takes its decisions on the basis of evidence and in the public interest.

MEMORIES OF KINELLAR PRIMARY SCHOOL

The closure and recent demolition of the local primary school will have evoked memories of school days for many residents in Blackburn. The school opened on the 23rd August 1928 with an attendance of around 100 children. It underwent 3 extensions prior to the decision to build a new school in order to accommodate the increasing number of pupils. At the time of closure there was a school roll of around 350.

A couple of former pupils, Gordon Barron and Kenny Gill reflect on their experiences as school boys....... Gordon attended the school from 1944 to 1950 and Kenny from 1967 to 1974. The first headmaster or dominie, Gordon recalls, was Mr Sutherland a popular local figure whilst during the period that Kenny was at school the headmaster was Mr Dave Gibson, who many may still remember. In the 1940s there were 4 teachers but by the late 1960s this had increased to 6 with several specialist teachers visiting the school each week to provide art, music and games lessons. They both remember with some admiration how dedicated all the staff were although also recall the corporal punishment administered in the form of a stick or belt to those who misbehaved. Back in the 1940s the toilets were outside and boys and girls had separate playgrounds with a dyke between them although this had changed by the 1960s.

Kenny is the proud owner of the key which first opened the school. It is handsomely designed, inscribed with the name Lady Elphinstone-Dalrymple, who presented it to the school, and contained in a box lined with dark blue satin. He bought it online several years ago as a keepsake because his family had had a connection with the school for 4 generations. His grandmother attended the school during the first year it opened, moving from the previous school premises at the Leys Hall, his mother from 1945-1950, followed by himself and then his daughter from 1993-1998.

Both Gordon and Kenny have fond memories of their school days, with friendships enduring to the present day. The school day was much the same length as now and so were the school holidays, barring in-service days for staff. The October holiday was always known as the 'Tattie holiday' because many children worked on local farm picking tatties. Gordon remembers history as his favourite subject and that there was a small museum of stuffed birds, and coins together with other trinkets on display in the hallway. He also enjoyed gym lessons with the freedom of moving about. Kenny fondly recollects school outings to Stonehaven open air swimming pool and to Pittodrie to see an under 21s football match. He also enjoyed the weekly visits to Inverurie swimming pool made on Easton's buses

All these memories are well and truly in the past and while the community eagerly awaits the building of a new primary school let's hope that the memories made by future pupils will be as happy as those of Gordon and Kenny.

Edinburgh Zoo and Camera Obscura were amongst the favourite day trips from their Perthshire base.

We also met Mr Sean Swindells for the first time. He came to join us for our Easter Whole School Assembly and very bravely signed up for a question and answer session in order for us to get to know him better. He was put on the 'hot seat' and we asked him a number of questions. He did very well and children enjoyed a giggle at some of his stories. Well done Sean- good sport!

Sports day is another big event for us. This year, the Kinellar Parent Council have generously funded coloured T-shirts for all the children. The children all wear their own House Colour. Clinterty, Caskieben, Glasgoforest, Begsley and Tappie compete for points in the races. **Contd on next page**

FINTRAY KINELLAR KEITHALL PARISH CHURCH

Dear Friends,

Let me ask you a strange question – how many of you enjoy paying tax? When you get your wage slip or pension statement, how many of you look at the amount of tax you have paid and feel you have done something good and positive and worthwhile? When you look at your P60 at the end of the tax year, how many of you feel an inward glow of satisfaction at the amount of tax you paid?

Recently at the request of a member of the family, I organised a small job on a property in Aberdeen. The work required was simple and straight forward. It took very little time to arrange. But what disappointed me was one individual who expected to be paid in cash and without a receipt. I was fairly certain this was for tax avoidance. If this was the case, it would have been undeclared income. (They did not get the job!) Of course, none of us like paying tax. But it is our income tax, national insurance and council tax that pays for roads and schools, hospitals and the armed forces. It is our tax giving that makes civilised society possible. There is a strong argument that tax avoidance is theft. Theft from the community and the denial of much needed resources. But there is a deeper truth here.

Some of Jesus most poignant and radical teachings concern our responsibilities to the people around us. The parable of the Good Samaritan is perhaps his best example. Using a simple but mischievous story, Jesus elucidates one of the key ethical teachings of the Christian Faith about loving and serving our neighbour. The same point is repeated in Leviticus 19:18 and Mark 12:31. We are to love our neighbour in the same way we love ourselves. The point of all this is that we humans are hard wired for relationships. We are designed and created to be mutually dependant on one another. We are not isolated individuals, who exist merely to fulfil our personal life choices. We have obligations to the people around us. We are part of a community and need to be earthed and rooted in the life of that community.

At the time of writing, the news has just broken of the terrible events in Manchester. By the time you read this letter, more will be known about the motivation of the attacker and identities of the unfortunate victims. What the news has also reported is the generous response of the local community. Muslim taxi drivers who turned off their meters and ferried family members from hospital to hospital as they sought news of their loved ones. People who opened their homes to complete strangers offering a bed for the night. There have been so many stories of acts of kindness and compassion in the face of this terrible atrocity.

Regretfully we do live in a world where bad things happen to good people. We cannot change this. But what we can do is enrich the lives of the people around us by remembering that we are interconnected. That our words and actions and choices don't just impact on ourselves. They impact on the people around us.
