RECENT EVENTS

EVENTS THIS TERM

COUNCILLOR REPORT

The row of large trees alongside the former A96 westwards from the Fintray Road junction is a prominent feature in Blackburn. Over the years, a number of the trees have been lost due to gales or ill-health. Unfortunately, just before Christmas, while carrying out the works to provide the new temporary nursery, the roots of three of the remaining trees were damaged by the contractor. For safety reasons, it was decided to ask the contractor to remove these trees (at the company's expense) as an independent advisor considered them to be at risk of falling in future in high winds. Following a review by Aberdeenshire Council's tree officer, it has been agreed that the remaining trees are also becoming unsafe and that they should all be replaced. The Council is currently considering options for replacing the rubble wall alongside the footpath, which has deteriorated badly over the last few years, and then planting a new row of limes and oaks, set back from the footpath. This work will be carried out following agreement with the planning officer.

The real-time bus information display unit for the bus shelter opposite the Leys Hotel serving westbound buses has been badly delayed. It should have been installed more than a year ago. I understand from transportation officers that the problem was arranging the electricity supply for the display unit. There are lights in the bus shelter but these are fed from the street light supply which is off during the day. I am now advised the problem has been solved and the information display unit should be in place shortly.

At the time of writing (mid-February), the Council has just decided its revenue budget for the financial year starting in April. The revenue budget is the budget that covers the running costs of Council services. Overall, to balance the 2017/18 budget, savings of over £20 million had to be found. Partly this is due to a cut in funding from the Scottish Government. Partly this is due to spending pressures, e.g. increased education spend due to a rise in the number of school pupils, increased demand for adult social care. The Council has managed to find significant savings from measures that do not reduce the services provided to residents. Savings are being achieved by increased efficiency, changes to new technology and lower prices for goods and services. However, to balance the budget, some cuts to services and increases in charges were unavoidable. The Council also decided to put up the Council Tax by 2.5 per cent, the first increase for nine years. For the benchmark Band D property, this is an increase of £28.53 per year, or just under 55 pence per week. Given the on-going demand-led spending pressures and the length of time since the last increase, in my view it would have been irresponsible for the Council not to seek additional income by raising the Council Tax this year. Council services like schools and care for the elderly really matter. Clearly, they have to be paid for, and the Council Tax (far from perfect though it is) is the only tax the Council can use to raise additional funds to keep services running.

Finally, I can confirm that construction of the new Kinellar School building is due to start before June so it will be ready for use in August 2018.

The following is an extract from a book written by the late Norman Gray, who lived in the village until his passing in 2003. He was the owner of a local merchants shop in the village, following in the footsteps of his father John Gray, who owned it for many years. Norman Gray was also a local historian and artist.

TURNPIKE ROAD FROM ABERDEEN TO INVERURIE

In the days before the construction of Turnpikes the road system was primitive; being little more than rough, badly maintained tracks over rocky and boggy terrain. Goods had to be transported on pack horses or dragged along, fixed between poles, in the manner of the Red Indians of North America. Apart from the few short summer months this proved to be a most arduous task for those sojourning over the old road in the early 1700s. The gradient was prohibitive and crossed the hill (the Tyrebagger Hill) near to the summit. In the latter part of that century a new route, to the south side of the hill was adopted.

Towards the end of the century improvements in agricultural methods demanded better communications. Population figures were increasing and better roads were required to transport the products of the land to markets in town and to convey manures, lime etc. back to the countryside.

With the passing of the Turnpike Act in 1795 the new Aberdeen — Inverurie turnpike was planned, to follow an easier route to the north of the Tyrebagger, but when the necessary subscriptions were called for, the response was very poor. On concluding a new survey, the southern side of the hill was chosen, as the route was shorter, had an easier gradient, required fewer bridges and would open up the rich farmlands around Kemnay and Monymusk. When the route was accepted by the Trustees, their chairman was ordered to demand further subscriptions from the country gentry to raise the required sum of £7000. This total was not achieved; however sufficient funding was available to allow construction to commence.

Adam Wilson of Glasgoego, solely among the subscribers, objected to the proposed route on the grounds that it would spoil his best farmland. On his acceptance of the route, with slight modifications, about a year after the road was opened he received compensation of £871 (including interest).

It is of interest to note that the Inverurie turnpike opened up George Street as the main western access to the town centre. From Aberdeen to Blackburn, a distance of 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ miles, road construction would cost £2500 per mile and from Blackburn to Midmill £227 per mile.

The road was eventually opened in October 1800 and a toll house was built at the top of the Tyrebagger hill. In the first year toll receipts amounted to £1035 and in ensuing years proved to be a profitable investment for the subscribers. The Toll House was unique in that toll was extracted at both ends of the house, from users of Aberdeen – Inverurie road and from those using the branch road to Skene. The post of toll keeper was put up to auction annually and the rent offered was generally £100. To recoup himself the toll keeper levied toll payments at the rate of 4d for a cart, 6d for a cab and $1\!\!/_{\!2}$ d per head of sheep and so
